Introduction

This marks my fifteenth annual report, and subsequently, I will delve into the changes observed in activity levels over the past 15 years. The primary objective is not to pinpoint the most successful clubs in Hurling or Football but to underscore Coiste na nÓg's continuous achievement of a key goal: increasing the participation of children in hurling and football.

From the outset, my role has been to ensure the seamless operation of our games, taking into account the diverse needs of individuals, ranging from elite Under 16 players to the Under 8 Football mentors stepping into the realm of Go Games.

In addition to providing support to the dedicated officers of Bord na nÓg, CCC1, CCC2, and Juvenile Hearings Committees, who generously contribute their time to the county, my responsibility extends to assisting all Club Juvenile Chairpersons and Secretaries, Delegates, Mentors, and Parents. This assistance encompasses explaining and offering advice on decisions made by our various officers.

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CCC1 Go Games Programme (U8 to U12)

The CCC1 season kicked off on Saturday, 11th February, with U12 Football, and by Saturday, 25th February, all five age groups had completed their initial round of games in both codes. Year on year, we observed a marginal decline of 1.5% in both Football and Hurling playing numbers. This marks the first instance of a decrease, and we eagerly anticipate the 2024 entries with heightened interest. The reduction maybe influenced by the impact of the pandemic on our nursery programs, particularly evident in the lower under 8 age group players entering CCC1 compared to the equivalent numbers in 2022.

For the 2023 season, CCC1 issued over 10,600 fixtures, strategically scheduling 24 dates for both codes. A total of 130 competitions were established, including 32 competitive U12 Leagues. This followed the completion of U12 grading games as teams transitioned from a multi-group Go Game format at U8 to U11, progressing to single teams at the under-12 age grade.

The 2023 season witnessed the implementation of the 2022 Go Games Rules Review, marking the first amendment to the playing rules since 2010. The review, conducted by the Coaching and Games Department under Ger O'Connor, Dublin GAA Director of Coaching and Club Development, received positive feedback. Clubs will be updated shortly on the approach to team entries for the 2024 season in December.

As stated earlier, this marks my fifteenth annual report, providing an opportunity to reflect on CCC1 activity levels over the past 15 years.

CCC1 encompasses games for U8, U9, U10, U11 & U12 age groups, occurring each Saturday morning countywide between 9:30 am and 1 pm. These fixtures, employing the Go Game model, totaled over 10,600 in 2023, evenly split between Hurling and Football.

The purpose of presenting these statistics is not to emphasize the achievements of specific clubs in Hurling or Football but rather to spotlight grassroots efforts over the past 15 years. While the data does highlight clubs that have witnessed significant growth, it's important to note that there are also instances of clubs that have regressed or struggled to capitalize on the overall increase in playing numbers. This could be attributed to various reasons. Consequently, it is crucial to collaborate with these clubs, addressing any obstacles they face, and fostering continuous development within the critical age group of Under 8 to Under 12.

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CCC2 Programme (U13 to U16)

In 2023, the season commenced on Saturday, February 11th, and by Sunday, February 26th, all grades in both football and hurling were underway. Throughout the year, CCC2 has meticulously organized 296 competitions and issued over 3,900 fixtures. Year on year, there has been a noteworthy 3% increase in football activity and a commendable 7% surge in hurling playing numbers.

The comprehensive program is designed to offer our young players a structured activity plan, including:

- U/13: 5 Grading matches and 9 League games, totaling 14 dates for both football and hurling.
- U/14: Phase One consists of 5 games, followed by Phase Two with another 5 games and Knockout matches, resulting in a total of 13 dates for both codes.
- U/15: Involves 5 Feile games, followed by 7 League matches, providing a total of 12 dates for each code.
- U/16: Encompasses a 7-game League, followed by Round Robin Championship and Knockout games, resulting in a total of 13 dates for both football and hurling.

As I draft this report, our ongoing competitions remain incomplete. Initially, the intention was to conclude the U13, U14, and U15 age categories by the week ending November 12th. The CCC2 season for our U16s was due to conclude on Saturday, November 25th, featuring Championship and Shield Football Finals. Unfortunately, adverse weather conditions in recent times have significantly disrupted our plans.

Currently, CCC2 is collaborating closely with the County Hurling & Football Development Officers, anticipating the National Development Calendar, which will provide the dates for the Feile and Development squad tournaments in 2024. In conjunction with Bord na nÓg and CCC1, our objective is to circulate a 2024 Juvenile Fixture Calendar akin to the one implemented in 2023.

While recent weeks have been marred by unfavorable weather, CCC2 is steadfast in the belief that the paramount goal is not merely to expedite the completion of our competitions in the early autumn, merely for the sake of meeting a deadline. Rather, our focus is on ensuring that our players have a comprehensive games program that keeps them engaged for as long as possible. This approach is not dictated solely by the desire to meet Finals dates promptly but is rooted in providing a meaningful and sustained experience for our players.

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In response to feedback from clubs in recent years, CCC2 has taken into consideration requests to avoid scheduling games on Bank Holiday Weekends and has refrained from planning a full program of activity in the months of July and August. While it may be disappointing and less than ideal to witness some competitions extending into the month of December, particularly for those involved in upcoming finals, we trust that the commitment to a player-centric approach will be appreciated.

Cathaoirleach CCC2, Declan Coulter, has more detail on the programme later in this report and I fully support his comments.

CCC2 games catering to the U13, U14, and U16 age groups are held on Saturday afternoons, while U15 matches are scheduled for Sunday mornings.

The guiding philosophy of Coiste na nÓg Átha Cliath is encapsulated in the mantra, "As many as possible, as long as possible, in the best environment possible." The return to the traditional under 18 age grade at the Club level has played a pivotal role in maximizing player participation at the under 16 age grades in Dublin. This is particularly evident in U16 Hurling and contributes significantly to the observed increase in CCC2 hurling this year compared to the previous year.

In Dublin, we have organized competitions throughout the entire year for every age grade up to and including under 16. With a well-defined and structured program, I firmly believe that our primary goal should be to keep as many of our players together within their respective age groups including at under 16. This approach ensures a clear and cohesive development pathway for our young athletes.

Discipline

When addressing the issue of discipline within our games, it is disheartening to witness the repeated instances of juvenile game abandonments across the nation, drawing attention through various media channels. The alleged abuse of referees has emerged as a significant concern, gaining national headlines and proliferating on social media platforms, often accompanied by video evidence.

I appreciate the introduction of Rule 7.3(o) in the Official Guide during Congress 2023, specifically targeting Team Officials officiating at Juvenile Games. This rule stipulates that for infractions falling under Rule 7.2(c) Categories IIa, IIIa, IVa, or Va, the minimum time suspension shall be doubled for Team Officials at Juvenile Games.

For instance, a Mentor receiving a straight Red Card in an under 13 Football match for Abusive language towards a Referee or Disruptive Conduct is charged under Rule 7.2(c) Category IIa. The application of new rule 7.3(o) results in a minimum suspension of eight weeks, along with a one-match suspension in the same Code and at the same Level.

However, a significant concern arises when considering the practical implications of this suspension. The suspended Mentor, potentially a parent of one of the players, can still take charge of the Under 13 Hurling team the following week. Is it possible his child could be denied playing football for eight weeks? Policing such suspensions, particularly with the vast number of teams involved (nearly 2,500 in 2023), poses a substantial challenge for CCC1 & CCC2.

It is imperative to prioritize the elimination of abuse directed at our referees, necessitating a cultural shift on GAA sidelines. While acknowledging that reeducating individuals will take time, there is a pressing need for clubs to take proactive measures. Clubs, through their structures, should act decisively to identify and address individuals who misbehave at all matches, especially juvenile games. Relying solely on Parnell Park to address these issues is an inadequate acknowledgment of responsibility by the club.

The unacceptable behavior witnessed at adult matches has no place in juvenile games, irrespective of perceived "mitigating circumstances." Should clubs with mentors, supporters, and players consistently in breach of regulations face sanctions? This is a crucial question that demands thoughtful consideration to ensure the fostering of a respectful and positive environment in our games.

- 18 Clubs issued with warnings on future behaviour v 26 in C'22

Concussion Awareness

We can take great pride in the escalating levels of activity in recent years, with an increasing number of children, both boys and girls, joining in our national sports. In light of this positive trend, it becomes imperative to underscore the significance of concussion education. Despite the multitude of games played each year, the reality is that many won't have trained medical personnel on-site. Therefore, it is crucial to emphasize to our juvenile mentors the importance of erring on the side of caution when a player sustains a blow to the head, ensuring that young players are not permitted to return to the pitch.

Reiterating this message consistently is vital. Our game regulations permit unlimited substitutions, providing mentors the flexibility needed to prioritize player safety. Even in U16 Championship games, where there are constraints on substitutions, a player can be replaced if there is a concern about concussion. Nevertheless, mentors should always consider the perspectives of the Referee, who is in closer proximity to any on-field collisions than those on the sideline. Let's reinforce the concussion message repeatedly to ensure the well-being of our young athletes.

Signs and Symptoms

Contrary to popular belief, most concussion injuries occur without a loss of consciousness and so it is important to recognise the other signs and symptoms of concussion.

Symptoms include:

- Headache
- Confusion
- Nausea
- Balance problems or dizziness
- Double/blurry vision
- Sensitivity to light
- Feeling sluggish, hazy or groggy
- Just not 'feeling right'
- Concentration/memory problems
- Pressure in hand

Return to Play

- A player with a diagnosed concussion should never be allowed to return to play on the day of injury.
- Return to play must follow a medically supervised stepwise approach and a player should never return to play while symptomatic.

Action Plan

- Recognise the signs and symptoms
- Report if suspicious, don't hide it
- Rehab with rest and medical guidance
- Return after following Return To Play Protocol and getting medical clearance

Chairperson CCC1 Annual Report

In January 2023 over 978 football teams and 877 hurling teams were entered in the CCC1 Go Games programme. This saw an marginals decrease of 1.5 % in Football Teams and 2.0 % decrease in Hurling teams on 2022. The scheduled games commenced on 26th February and concluded 4th November which will see some U12 playoffs taking place up to 2nd December. Many friendlies continue to be arranged for U8-U11's so that's a lot of games for our juvenile teams in the county!

Congratulations to all U12 teams at every level who have won themselves a Dublin medal. It's a big achievement for our little ones.

It really is great to see so many players participating in CCC1 Go Games every week. However, there is one gripe that has been raised at our delegate meetings and that is teams showing up on a Saturday with well under the prescribed number of players. This can leave young players on the sideline for the opposition. This is not what CCC1 Go games are about. CCC1 would again ask clubs to really assess if they are capable of fulfilling the number of team entries chosen at the start of the year.

With the above in mind, I welcome the implementation of the New Go Games rules in full as set out by Ger O'Connor and his team in the Coaching and Games Department. As well as the rule changes, these new rules will now allow for a smaller number of players to play on each team which will of course be beneficial to our young players while also helping teams that struggle for numbers on a Saturday morning. I wish clubs every success with these new rules on the ground and look forward to getting positive feedback in 2024.

We are also bringing back our blitzes into the Games programme. There will be one blitz played by each age group in the year. The code will get rotated every year. These blitzes were always a huge success with the players so I thank Damian for being able to get this back up and running in 2024.

There was no negative feedback on the CCC1 Games schedule at the CCC1 Delegates meeting held in October.

I would ask all clubs to encourage their lead U12 mentor to attend the delegate meeting so that they can get an idea as to how the gradings at U12 work. It is so important that they try to get this right from the get go in January.

Discipline

While the number of referee reports filed with CCC1 was not huge, the fact remains that there was still disciplinary issues at some of our underage games. What were the issues?

- Mentors shouting abuse at the ref
- Mentors shouting abuse at the players
- Mentors shouting abuse at opposition mentors
- Parents shouting abuse at the ref / opposition mentors

We must remember that this not and will never be acceptable behaviour. I do understand that some clubs are trying to deal with this at the older levels, but sad to say clubs need to take a closer look at the U8-U12 age groups too. Some clubs have been disciplined by CCC1 and we will continue to do so where necessary. We are all aware of the shortage of referees so we need to start as we mean to go on. Mentors and players represent our clubs every time the team takes to the pitch. Good behaviour usually starts with the team mentors and this is reflected by the players and also by the sideline.

I would also ask that clubs, while trying to defend their mentors at times, accept that ill discipline on the sideline towards referees/players/opposition mentors will not be accepted by CCC1.

Thanks also to Decaln O'Leary, Cathaoirleach Bord na nÓg and Declan Coulter, Cathaoirleach CCC2.

I would like to thank all the volunteers at club level who make it all happen week in week out. To all the referee co-ordinators who ensure the teams have referees for their games, to all pitch co-ordinators who allocate pitch space to home teams and to all the team mentors who ensure the young players get to play their games at the weekend. Most of all I would like to thank, the players and their parents for their commitment to making our hurling and football programme a success during the year.

Last but not least to Damian Murphy, Runaí, Coiste na nÓg. Without Damian none of the above would happen. While we all think club level, Damian has to think and plan for Dublin. He is always in search of new ideas to promote both codes and to try and get as many young players involved in GAA from an early age. Without his help and outstanding organisational skills, CCC1 would not be the resounding success it is in Dublin.

Chairperson CCC2 Annual Report

This is my first year as Cathaoirleach CCC2 having taken over the role from Declan O'Leary and I would like to thank Declan for all his support and advice over the year. Once again, this year we have seen an increase in player participation and teams entering our competitions. This can only be testament to the great work and commitment from all involved and I would like to thank club delegates, club officers, committee members and all who commit their time and energy to supporting and promoting our juvenile games programmes.

Our games programmes for this year have not yet concluded however I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate all who compete for their teams, clubs, supporters and for their own personal enjoyment.

Competitions

Our competitions for 2023 were due to finish on 25th November with the last U16 championship finals. However bad weather has caused a bit of havoc with the past couple of weeks, and we find ourselves with a mix of games, semi-finals, and finals still to complete in different age groups. We built in a back match date of 2nd December but may find that we must go beyond this. However, the committee have made the decision that we will not fix any games beyond the 9th of December and any unfinished competitions may have to be concluded towards the end of January 2024.

We continued our 2023 programme of competitions on the same basis as 2022 in terms of league and championship format which has been very successful to date. The competition format that has raised some questions and has been discussed at the recent CCC2 delegates meeting is the under 15 Feile na Gael and Feile Peil na nÓg which continues as a multi weekend competition as opposed to single weekend. The benefits of multi weekend far outweigh single weekend not least of all for the fact that we can continue to include shield competitions giving teams more games and opportunity to compete in semi-finals and finals.

The requirement for panels to be submitted at a certain stage of championship competitions has helped to balance the competitions and stop clubs from moving players between A & B teams to gain an advantage.

Referees

Put quite simply, our games programme and competitions would not happen without our referees and a special thank you to all who referee our games on a weekly basis. While some may take for granted that a referee will be appointed, and with a

confirmation call from club mentors that the referee will turn up on the day. What people may not be aware of is, the amount of organising and communication that it takes to make sure referees are appointed and available. On this note a special thanks to Danny Harrington for his tireless work to make all this happen each week.

In terms of the numbers of referees supplied by clubs it is still disappointing to see some clubs enter multiple teams at the various age groups and yet supply a minimal number of referees or none at all.

The plea from CCC2 to all clubs is to please look at the number of "active" referees you supply and encourage club members to get involved.

Discipline

Unfortunately, as with previous years, discipline [or lack of] continues to be a matter of concern. The report by secretary Coiste na nÓg gives a breakdown of disciplinary notices in terms of numbers, sanctions, fines etc. However, it is not just the numbers that are of concern but rather the abuse by some mentors, parents, supporters, and sidelines towards referees, opposition sidelines and in some cases towards juvenile players.

It would be wrong to suggest that this happens at all games and in fact if balanced against the number of games played on a weekly basis, one could argue that it is quite a low percentage. However, it simply should not happen at all and the level of abuse that can be shocking and can range from,

- Persistent challenging of referee authority
- Foul, abusive and threatening language
- Threatening behaviour towards referees
- Following referees to car/carpark after a game??
- Negative verbal interaction with juvenile players.

This year we have lost one referee who has decided to stop because of abuse received at games. The behaviour of sidelines feeds into the behaviour of players on the pitch and we can usually see a correlation between the two.

While CCC2 will where possible, issue a sanction against individuals, we will ultimately hold clubs responsible for the behaviour of mentors, parents & supporters.

Some clubs when issued with notices and sanctions have taken positive steps to address the issue. We would ask that all clubs please inform sidelines that any type of abusive behaviour is simply not acceptable and will not be tolerated.

2024 - Calendar

While we have not yet been in a position to issue a calendar [draft] for 2024 we will aim to do this for the first week in December. However, we will work on the basis that the 2024 Calander will mirror and follow the same format as this year.

- *U13 Grading Leagues followed by League (single round)*
- U14 Qualifying Round Robin in two phases, followed by Cup competitions. Grading will be a combination of self-grading and U13 grading League performance from 2022.
- U15 Dublin Féile multi-weekend model in Spring and Leagues concluding in Autumn.
- U16 League & Championship model

We will also aim to keep with the holiday break in late July through August.

This year we met only once in person to deal with a number of cases. A number of other cases were dealt with online and via email. Almost all cases involved, unfortunately, misbehaviour by adults.

I would like to thank all clubs who availed of our committee's procedures and Runai, Coiste na nOg, who were unfailingly polite and courteous to deal with. I would ask all clubs to be respectful of referees as we move forward into next season. Unfortunately most of the cases that come before us often involve poor behaviour which, in this day and age, really cannot be tolerated any more. While all parties are entitled to a fair hearing, this committee will not hold back from penalising people and clubs who abuse referees. It is also worth noting that young people imitate what they see adults doing. This needs to be borne in mind.

It's also incumbent on clubs to know the rules of seeking hearins and appealing decisions. A lot of clubs don't and this can often result in requests for hearings being ruled out of order.

I would like to thank the members of the committee for their help and assistance during the year.
