Introduction

Last year, my report focused on activity levels over the past 15 years. This year, I aim to highlight team entries for the 2024 season, categorized by Club and Code.

We offer a comprehensive games program for both hurling and football. These programs are divided by age group, with CCC1 overseeing age grades under 8, under 9, under 10, under 11, and under 12, while CCC2 administers grades under 13, under 14, under 15, and under 16.

In 2024, clubs entered a total of 2,560 teams:

- 1,885 teams had fixtures organized by CCC1.
- 675 teams participated in competitions run by CCC2.

The purpose of this analysis is not to identify the most successful clubs but to emphasize that *Coiste na nÓg* continues to meet its core objective: increasing the number of children playing hurling and football. This achievement is a testament to the dedication of countless individuals who give their time every week.

These efforts include coaches whose primary aim is to ensure children experience the joy of playing. Parents play a key role in arranging travel and helping on match days. Club members work tirelessly to maintain facilities, manage pitch upkeep, and fundraise for their teams.

This collective effort reflects the Olympian values and goodwill inherent in our games. At the juvenile level in Dublin, this is something we can all be immensely proud of.

CCC1 Go Games Programme (U8 to U12)

The CCC1 programme continues to be the bedrock of our juvenile activity. In 2024 just under 11,000 fixtures issued split almost evenly between Football and Hurling. Year on Year we saw a marginal increase of +0.8% in both Football and Hurling playing numbers.

In 2023 we had observed a marginal decline of -1.5% which marked the first instance of a decrease. So, the activity levels this year for age grades under 8 to under 12 are just below 2022 levels. In 2018 we saw +6%, 2020 +3% & 2022 +5%. Are we witnessing the impact of the pandemic on our nursery programs during Covid?

The CCC1 season commenced on Saturday 10th February with U12 Football grading games and all five age groups were in action for Hurling on Saturday 17th February while the full Football season started on February 24th. It has been CCC1 policy to have the opposite code to CCC2 playing each Saturday morning. We manage to achieve this in the early months of the year and for post summer activity.

Last year we witnessed the implementation of the 2022 Go Games Rules Review, marking the first amendment to the playing rules since 2010. The 2024 season continues to see positive feedback and this year saw a review of Go Games Rules relating to Team Numbers. In submitting team entries Clubs were asked to use maximum number for each Go Game Team entered.

Following the grading process in early January 2024, Clubs team entries at U8, U9, U10 & U11 (1,655 teams) where committed to the groupings they were placed in until the end of June 2024. For the post Summer programme CCC1 allowed clubs to move groups to facilitate increased/decreased numbers for the remainder of the 2024 season. While we saw many requested changes nothing greater than for a normal year.

Cathaoirleach CCC1, Maura Ryan, has more information on the CCC1 season later in this report.

CCC2 Programme (U13 to U16)

The 2024 season commenced the weekend February 10th & 11th and by weekend February 24th & 25th all age grades in both codes had commenced. CCC2 has organised and run 322 competitions this year and issued over 3,800 fixtures like last year. A total of 675 teams took part in these competitions of which 40% (268) are a Clubs B, C, D teams. Of the 675 teams 377 Football & 298 Hurling.

The programme provides our young players with the following activity plan:

- U/13 Football & Hurling 14 dates each code
- U/14 Football & Hurling 13 dates each code
- U/15 Football & Hurling 12 dates each code
- U/16 Football & Hurling 13 dates each code

All our competitions have been completed. This is a great achievement bearing in mind the number of games we lost at the start of season due to bad weather. As I wrote this report last year CCC2 had ongoing competitions due to adverse weather conditions in the period October into November 2023. The programme was eventually completed 10th December.

At the recent CCC2 County Delegates meeting in late October a full discussion of the programme took place. One of issues raised was the early conclusion of the U14 season for the 50% of Teams who failed to reach a U14 Cup or Shield semi-final. CCC2 is currently working on the 2025 calendar with Bord na nÓg and will take on board the feedback received at that meeting.

The committee in recent years has taken on board this feedback from clubs to avoid scheduling games on Bank Holiday Weekends and has refrained from planning a full program of activity in the months of July and August. CCC2 was badly impacted last year by the weather in the Autumn but accept the concern regarding our U14s this year.

Cathaoirleach CCC2, Declan Coulter, has more detail on the programme later in this report and I fully support his comments.

Feile

I have a deep appreciation of Féile's history, dating back to its inauguration in 1971 as Féile na nGael, with Féile Peil na nÓg introduced in 1982. Féile has grown into a national festival of Hurling, Football, Camogie, Ladies Football, and Handball for boys and girls.

Historically, Féile catered to the Under-14 age grade, but in 2020, it was decided to shift to Under-15 starting in 2021. While the 2020 Féile was initially run across several weekends due to Covid, it was ultimately suspended on September 18th following Dublin's move to Level 3 restrictions (*remember Level 3?*). The national age change, however, allowed players born in 2006 to participate in 2021 as U15s, ensuring they weren't denied their Féile experience due to the pandemic.

In 2021, Féile na nGael and Féile Peil na nÓg adopted a multi-weekend format, guaranteeing each team at least four games. This approach also introduced Shield competitions for teams finishing 3rd or 4th in their groups. In 2024, the Féile Finals Day hosted 78 teams across 20 Féile Cups and 19 Shields.

While the Shield format expanded opportunities, CCC2 and Bord na nÓg noted that some of the "traditional Féile" experience was missing. At the recent CCC2 County Delegates meeting in October 2024, the "Revised Multiple Weekends with a Finals Day" format was endorsed for Féile 2025. This structure balances competitive participation with the essence of Féile: enjoyment for players and families.

"Our Mentors"

This year, we supported 2,560 teams with the dedication of over 5,000 mentors. Many of our juvenile mentors are novices, and the following are the minimum requirements to become a coach:

- GAA membership
- Garda vetting
- Safeguarding training
- Completion of the Introduction to Coaching Gaelic Games course

Our mentors' behaviours are shaped by a combination of informal and formal learning experiences, as well as their own past playing experiences. To ensure their continued development, it's essential to provide both ongoing formal and informal support throughout their coaching journey.

Clubs should implement a structure that facilitates:

- The transfer of skills and knowledge
- Sharing prior experiences in dealing with CCC1 and CCC2
- Utilizing insights from the player pathway
- Supporting mentors in communication, relationship building, and organization

Creating a robust structure within clubs is crucial to transferring lessons learned at each age level to new mentors. This ensures not only the success of training programs but also a strong foundation for how to approach each season.

Ultimately, juvenile coaches play a key role in leaving a lasting, positive impact on young players. By imparting knowledge, demonstrating care, and bringing energy and enthusiasm to their coaching, they can foster lifelong experiences and meaningful relationships with their players.

Discipline

The only competitive fixtures at CCC1 level are the U12 leagues. In late October, CCC1 decided not to hold playoffs for the U12 Football and U12 Hurling Leagues. Instead:

- 1. If two teams are tied for first place, two sets of winners' medals will be issued.
- 2. If three teams are tied for second place, three sets of runners-up medals will be issued.

This decision, though regrettable, was prompted by an unacceptable rise in misconduct by mentors and supporters. The U12 leagues include 16 football divisions and 13 hurling divisions. Recently, CCC1 received allegations of clubs playing higher-level players in lower divisions and fielding their best U11 players to win titles. Playoffs were deemed likely to exacerbate these issues, along with potential sideline disputes among opposing mentors and supporters. Despite offering teams 12 games throughout the season, this decision was deemed the best course of action under the circumstances.

In early October, as the season reached its conclusion, I issued the following **Discipline Sanction Reminders** to clubs:

- 1. Abusive language towards a referee by a CCC1/CCC2 player: Minimum two-match suspension in the same code and level.
- 2. Abusive language towards a referee by a team official: Minimum eight-week suspension across all codes and levels (all GAA activity).
- 3. Racist, sectarian, or anti-inclusion behaviour by a CCC1/CCC2 player: Minimum 24-week suspension across all codes and levels.

Historically, brawls and melees among juvenile players are rare and usually driven by adults' sideline behaviour. CCC1 & CCC2 consistently act on referee reports, ensuring there are real consequences for misconduct. Disciplinary decisions are not overturned, and most players and clubs accept sanctions without hearings. I hope this reassures everyone that Dublin juvenile CCCs take misconduct seriously and uphold a strong stance against it.

The below data based on fully processed discipline since last year's report:

- 224 Disciplinary Notices issued compared to 194 in 2023
- Clubs fined € 6,100 v €3,650 in C'23 (21 offences, 5 Clubs fined twice)
- 181 Straight Red Cards issued to Players v 168 in C'23
- 18 Clubs issued with warnings on future behaviour v 18 in C'23

In this section I also include 854 incidents of the following breaches of CCC2 regulations:

The equivalent figure for last year was around 400. It seems some Clubs / Teams believe fines will not be issued / sought!!!

CCC2 Referees

Here I Go Again: Another Year, Another Report, and Still No Progress

The biggest issue facing CCC2 continues to be the inadequate supply of referees by clubs to fulfil the demands of our games. This persistent shortage makes assigning referees—and replacing them when necessary—a constant struggle every week once the season begins.

Every week, Danny Harrington, a dedicated volunteer member of CCC2, assigns approximately 160 referees to cover the weekend's matches. On hurling weekends, the number of games is slightly lower, but so is the availability of referees. On average, about 60 games require reassignment, necessitating approximately 100 additional interventions by Danny—from the initial assignment to ensuring the latest referee information is updated on the website before the game begins.

One weekend this year, 17 games proceeded without an assigned referee from CCC2. This number would undoubtedly be higher without the goodwill and flexibility of our referees, many of whom willingly travel to alternative venues at short notice. Unfortunately, this cooperative spirit is often met with complaints from team mentors over minor delays of 15–20 minutes caused by referee availability. Ironically, these complaints often come from clubs that contribute no referees—or an embarrassingly low number compared to their team entries.

I want to express my deep gratitude to Danny Harrington for his tireless efforts in assigning referees for CCC2 fixtures despite these challenges. It is frustrating that, despite introducing and amending the "Referee Juvenile Youth Games" course (formerly Level 3) to make it easier for anyone in a club to step forward, participation remains disappointingly low.

The ratio analysis below examines the number of Active Referees relative to CCC2 teams entered. **Note:** The benchmark ratio of 1 referee per 5 teams is an arbitrary figure used solely for this exercise. This minimum target was established approximately four years ago, and the results clearly demonstrate its impact/lack!!! The term "Active Referees" is used intentionally, as many referees provided by clubs were either uninterested, regularly declined assignments, or failed to meet safeguarding standards.

Chairperson CCC1 Annual Report

Go Games Programme

In January 2024 over 996 football teams and 889 hurling teams were entered in the CCC1 Go Games programme. This saw an increase of 0.9 % in Football Teams and 0.5 % in Hurling teams on 2023. The scheduled games commenced on 17th February and concluded 2nd November. Friendlies, both inside and outside the county continue to be arranged for U8-U12's. That is a huge number of games for our young players to be involved in.

Many congrats to all U12 players who bagged themselves a medal in what is their first experience of the League table. Medals were given to teams who finished 1st and 2nd in their respective leagues. Best of luck to all mentors and players as they self grade again next year as they move into CCC2 games.

This year was a great year in the sense that we saw the return of the U8-U11 blitzes. The blitzes had stopped owing to the Covid years so many of our young players/teams had not experienced how enjoyable the morning of games actually is. CCC1 decided to run Football for U8 in April, Hurling for U9 age group in June, Football for U10 in September and Hurling for U11 in October. Each club hosted circa 3 teams. The response for the blitzes was electric and the County Board received huge positive feedback. All players got to participate in a fun morning of games and all received a medal for their efforts(what a difference adding a ribbon to a medal makes). Our younger players really enjoyed this experience and will look forward to their next blitz coming up in 2025. All thanks goes to Damian for bringing the blitzes back and managing to find pitches and fixtures to satisfy all.

There has been no negative feedback received from clubs in relation to the implementation of the New Go Games Rules in 2024. This is very positive as it allowed for our younger players to get more touches on the ball.

Discipline

I am disheartened to see an increase in the number of reports from CCC1 referees, each reporting some form of misbehaviour/abuse from players and/or mentors on the sideline. I note that many of the reports came towards the end of the season when our U12 games, in particular were reaching the final stages. I am not putting forward the closing end to a season as being an excuse but it definitely seems to tip many players/mentors and the sideline over the edge! Abuse towards our referees (many of whom are only 16yrs of age) is NEVER acceptable. We as mentors need to understand and act on this if we wish the players to follow suit. The **GIVE RESPECT GET RESPECT** model must at all times be adhered to at each and every game.

I would like to note that CCC1 takes each report seriously and investigates every incident to the nth degree. Clubs will, and do get fined for this kind of behaviour. We must remember this is where it all starts for our younger players but it also where it starts for many of our young referees. I know that so many leave this role behind as they are not being allowed to improve and enjoy this experience. Hence, we have a shortage of referees. I would also ask clubs, that while trying to defend their mentors at times, accept that il discipline on the sideline towards referees/players/opposition mentors will not be tolerated by CCC1.

Thanks

I would like to thank everyone who has helped make CCC1 programme successful this year. To my colleagues on CCC1, Paul and Grainne for all their dedicated work throughout the year. Thanks to Finbar O'Mahony, Runaí Dublin County Board and Mick Seavers, Cathaoirleach Dublin County Board for their constant support of our young players. Thanks also to Bernie McLoughlin, Cathaoirleach Bord na nÓg and Declan Coulter, Cathaoirleach CCC2. I would also like to thank Anne O'Dea who works behind many email address such as admin and juvresults.

I would like to thank all the volunteers at club level who make it all happen week in week out. To all the referee co-ordinators who ensure the teams have referees for their games, to all pitch co-ordinators who allocate pitch space to home teams and to all the team mentors who ensure the young players get to play their games at the weekend. Most of all I would like to thank, the players and their parents for their commitment to making our hurling and football programme a success during the year.

Last but not least to Damian Murphy, Runaí, Coiste na nÓg. Without Damian none of the above would happen. While we all think club level, Damian has to think and plan for Dublin. He is always in search of new ideas to promote both codes and to try and get as many young players involved and stay involved in GAA from an early age. Without his help and outstanding organisational skills, CCC1 would not be the resounding success it is in Dublin.

Chairperson CCC2 Annual Report

As the 2024 season draws to a close, we look back on a programme of games/competitions that is the envy of most other counties and gives our players and teams/clubs a balanced fixture programme in both codes. While participation numbers have increased steadily over the past number of years, 2024 saw a levelling off with numbers on a par with 2023 [see report from Rúnaí Coiste na nÓg]. Once again none of this would be possible without the great work and commitment from all involved and I would like to thank club delegates, club officers, committee members and all who commit their time and energy to supporting and promoting our juvenile games programmes.

I would also like to take this opportunity to congratulate all who compete for their teams, clubs, family and supporters and for their own personal enjoyment.

Competitions

While last year the weather caused problems for our competitions at the latter end of the season. 2024 saw us lose about three weeks at the beginning of the season. Despite this drawback we have managed with the help and support of mentors and clubs to claw back this lost time and finish most competitions in line with the calendar dates. Our last scheduled competition date was 23rd November [U16 Football Championship finals] and at the time of writing apart from one drawn final to be replayed on 30th November all competitions have concluded on time.

We continued our 2024 programme of competitions on the same basis as 2023 in terms of league and championship format which has been very successful to date.

Feile na Gael and Feile na Peil have for the past number of years been run on a multi weekend basis and has been very successful in allowing us to include shield competitions and giving teams more games and allowing more teams to compete in semi-finals and finals. We are very conscious of, and it has been voiced by some clubs that the multi-weekend competition may not have the same Feile [festival] feel as a single weekend competition. At a recent CCC2 delegates meeting the committee presented a proposal for a multi weekend competition with a concluding day of semi-finals and finals. This would allow teams a maximum number of games while still competing in a Feile day of semi-finals and finals. This proposal was well received, and we will look to build this into the 2025 calendar. The successful running of this would rely on clubs supporting this with the hosting of the semi-finals and finals.

The requirement for panels to be submitted at a certain stage of championship competitions has helped to balance the competitions and stop clubs from moving players between A & B teams to gain an advantage and will be continued into the 2025 season.

Referees

This season our games programme and competitions were under severe pressure because of the shortage of referees. Our games programme would not be possible without our referees and a special thank you to all who referee our games on a weekly basis.

It is not by chance or by any automated programme that referees are appointed to games but in fact a lot of time effort and organising goes into appointing and allocating referees on a weekly basis.

On this note a special thanks to Danny Harrington for his tireless work to make all this happen each week.

Once again, this year it is disappointing to see some clubs enter multiple teams at the various age groups and yet supply a minimal number of referees or none at all.

We have at this stage a major issue with the shortage of referees available to cover all our fixtures and run the risk of games having to proceed without a neutral referee.

The plea from CCC2 to all clubs is to please look at the number of "active" referees you supply and encourage club members to get involved.

Discipline

We can look at our games discipline record in terms of numbers and comparisons with previous years and in relation to the number of fixtures etc. In fact, if looked at in relation to the number of fixtures most games proceed in a sporting and respectful manner.

However, there is still an unacceptable level of discipline issues with some mentors, supporters and sideline behaviour in general.

Players are rarely a problem in themselves but when there are issues, we can usually see a direct correlation with the behaviour of their own or the oppositions sideline.

Apart from the numbers it is the behaviour and level of abuse by some mentors, parents, supporters and sidelines towards, referees, opposition and in some cases towards juvenile players.

- Persistent challenging of referee authority
- Foul abusive and threatening language
- Threatening behaviour towards referees
- Following referees to car/carpark after a game

CCC2 will continue to issue sanctions against individuals where possible but we ultimately hold clubs responsible for the behaviour of mentors, supporters and partisans and will issue sanctions against clubs.

We ask that clubs remind mentors, parents and supporters alike that any type of abusive behaviour is simply not acceptable and will not be tolerated.

2025- Calendar

We are currently working on the games Calendar for 2025 and should be able to issue this by w/c 16th December. We will work on the basis that the 2025 Calander will mirror and follow the same format as this year with Feile changes.

- U13 Grading League's followed by League (single round)
- U14 Qualifying Round Robin in two phases, followed by Cup competitions. Grading will be a combination of self-grading and U13 grading League performance from 2024.
- U15 Dublin Féile multi-weekend model with Feile finals day in Spring and Leagues concluding in Autumn.
- U16 League & Championship model

We will also aim to keep with the exam and holiday break in late July through August.

<u> Coiste Eisteachta na nÓg – Juvenile Hearings Committee Report -202</u>4

Coiste Eisteachta na nOg is the Juvenile Hearings Committee. We arrange and conduct hearings sought by clubs into various disciplinary sanctions issued by CCC1 and CCC2. This year we met only once in person to deal with a number of cases. A number of other cases were dealt with online and via email. Almost all cases involved, unfortunately, misbehaviour by adults. We have only had a few hearings involving players in several years now, which suggests at least that on pitch matters and decisions by the ref and CCC2 are being respected.

I would like to thank all clubs who availed of our committee's procedures and Runai, Coiste na nOg, who were unfailingly polite and courteous to deal with. I would ask all clubs to be respectful of referees as we move forward into next season. Unfortunately most of the cases that come before us often involve poor behaviour towards them which, in this day and age, really cannot be tolerated any more. While all parties are entitled to a fair hearing, this committee will not hold back from penalising people and clubs who abuse referees. It is also worth noting that young people imitate what they see adults doing. This needs to be borne in mind.

It's also incumbent on clubs to know the rules of seeking hearings and appealing decisions. A lot of clubs don't and this can often result in requests for hearings being ruled out of order. It is also worth noting that some clubs present their entire case in writing before a hearing which in many ways renders the hearing somewhat pointless as the committee has already received the information necessary to make a decision.

I would like to thank the members of the committee for their help and assistance during the year.
